NHS funding for surgery to remove anal skin tags is a LOW PRIORITY unless there is a suspicion/risk of malignancy.

Anal skin tags are extra skin that hangs from the peri-anal area. Anal skin tags can be a nuisance, itchy and uncomfortable. They may coexist with other anal conditions such as haemorrhoids or anal fissure but skin tags do not normally need to be removed.

Where anal skin tags are present with other conditions, those conditions may be treated if there is a clinical need and an NHS service is commissioned.
