ICS Digital and Data Strategy Delivery Update

Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West ICB Board meeting – 21 Nov 2023

Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West Integrated Care System

The ICB board approved the Digital and Data Strategy in May 2023. The strategy set out a range of outcomes and priorities under three strategic themes of Digitise, Connect and Transform, a delivery programme and a costed (but not fully funded) plan.

This pack provides a summary overview of progress in delivery of the strategy through four lenses:

- 1) System governance
- 2) Stakeholder engagement
- 3) Programme delivery
- 4) Finances




System Governance



Digital and data can be the catalyst for transformational change across an integrated care system. We recognise and have agreed the need for digital transformation to be embedded in the broader transformation programmes across the system, with specific coordination and oversight of digital capabilities and enablers now establish in support.

While relatively new, the model is already providing beneficial. For example, decision making for how we invest the national Health Technology Adoption Accelerator Funding (HTAAF) was directed by the Steering Group to focus on a small number of bids that aligned with strategy. As the system matures there are opportunities to develop this further – strengthening links with system change programmes and more routinely sharing business plans during their developmental phase to identify duplication, shared learning and increase value returned from our digital investment.



Stakeholder engagement



The first BOB ICS digital summit was held in September in Reading. We believe this may be the first ICS-wide summit of its kind nationally, held with over 200 colleagues in attendance from across the NHS, local authority, VCSE, Health Innovation Network, patient groups and social care.

The summit provided an excellent foundation to showcase the outstanding work underway across BOB and provide an opportunity for people to connect and learn how they can contribute to, share and use the capabilities being developed across the system.


The summit started with a panel focussed on health inequalities, heard from NHS England on plans for developing our digital workforce and concluded with a real-life example of artificial intelligence that has been developed within BOB improving outcomes for patients who experience stroke. We also had over 20 stalls showcasing the work across BOB from hospital at home to population health management.

Attendee feedback has been excellent. A series of short videos are now live on YouTube and being shared on social media which spotlight the projects and key highlights of the day. The team are considering the shape and nature of future events to build on this success.

Programme delivery – key points



- Delivery of several milestones for this year are reliant on the release of national funding in the second half of the 2023/24
- Frontline Digitisation national Electronic Patient Record (EPR) programme
 - The central governance has been exceptionally complex to navigate. Issues with EPR implementations elsewhere are increasing the focus on this programme. Note that both Buckinghamshire Healthcare Trust (BHT) and Oxford Health Foundation Trust (OHFT) are primarily focussed on enhancing their existing systems and digitising process rather than implementing entire new systems.
 - BHT EPR outline business case has been through numerous review loops with NHSE. Approval is anticipated in December with Full Business
 Case approval anticipated in March. Interim funding is being sought from NHSE to allow the programme to continue delivery however if this is not
 received there will be a substantial risk to delivery.
 - OHFT EPR business case has also been through numerous iterations with NHSE. Funding approval is expected in December.
- Data Sharing and Intelligence
 - Thames Valley & Surrey Shared Care and Population Health Management (PHM) programme has made substantial progress in implementation
 across Buckinghamshire and Berkshire West. Planning to onboard Oxford University Hospitals (OUH) is well advanced. Issues remain with getting
 agreement from Oxfordshire GP practices to adopt an ICS-wide shared care record.
 - Thames & Valley & Surrey Secure Data Environment for Research has been awarded tier-1 national funding. OUH as host organisation are
 completing internal governance and have initiated a comprehensive engagement programme to understand public views on use of data and
 navigate how to manage the complexities of health data research with academia, industry and health partners
 - In conjunction with FrimleyICB we have submitted a business case to NHSE to in-house Business Intelligence services from South Central & West Commissioning Support Unit. This supports development of locally relevant operational data flows in conjunction with partners across the ICB and provide rich intelligence to stakeholders across the system. This is a critical enabler for the ICS.
 - We continue to engage with NHS England on the Federated Data Platform programme which aspires to connect operational data across health & care. We look forward to the contract award from NHSE and learning more about how we may benefit from this capability once available.
- Virtual Wards and Digitising Social Care milestones are on track to be delivered before target dates in 2024. Virtual ward capacity is ahead of trajectory and leading nationally.
- Several milestones for future years do not yet have a specific delivery plan and are therefore coloured amber "at risk" (e.g. develop analytics CoE, Consolidate patient portals, Social care Digital passport).


Delivery of the strategy is adapting as funding becomes available.




The strategy include a <u>costed</u> plan rather than a <u>fully funded</u> plan. EPR implementation for OHFT and BHT has been delayed while navigating national funding approvals. Cyber security strategy funding is expected in 2024/25 and the national Digital, Data and Technology workforce plan has been delayed.

Good progress has been made on digitising social care records, falls prevention, digital diagnostics and virtual wards/hospital at home.


Digital & data workstreams that support ICS Transformations do not appear on the roadmap. Progress against this roadmap should therefore not be considered as the only target for ICS digital and data. Further detail on all programmes was presented to the System Productivity Committee meeting on 7 November.




ICS Digital & Data Portfolio (19.10.2023)



Finances: National Funding Sources for ICS Digital & Data

Most digital transformation remains locally funded and delivered. The ICS efficiency coordination group digital workstream has made little progress due to lack of access to unified spend and commercial data.

The table below only references external funding that is applicable across the system. There is an opportunity to better manage the finances of digital and data investment with dedicated financial and procurement support.




